PARENTS EVENING

YEAR 8

Year 8 parents evening had a good turn out despite not having a parents evening in year 7 – with over half of the students attending with parents and careers. Families were eager to meet teachers and their pastoral staff with each meeting discussing their academic achievements within each lesson and parents asking how they can support outside of school. Results of the parents' survey were outstanding, receiving 100% positive feedback. Parents were happy with how supportive the school is and the communication between parents' and school.

Year 11 Parents Evening was a great success with over 75% of parents attending the evening. Students that attended with their parents received their mock results and details of interventions that are due to take place in the New Year. All students met with curriculum staff to discuss their results and gain important feedback.

Flu Vaccinations were a great success this year with the most consents that we have ever had!

Intrahealth came into the academy over two days and delivered nasal spray and injections to over 400 students!

Reading at TOAN

Reading is Magic Festival

We celebrated Reading is Magic Festival between **2nd - 6th October!** There were so many writers, illustrators and poets who took part in the five-day festival.

Inspiration for the name comes from Waterstones Children's Laureate 2019-2022 Cressida Cowell's key message 'reading is magic, and magic is for everyone'. We celebrated the award-winning children's author and creator of *How to Train Your Dragon* and *The Wizards of Once* book in our celebration of the festival.



Sparx Reader

Sparx Reader is a reading, comprehension and vocabulary programme that gets all young people reading regularly to help improve their literacy and motivates them to read for pleasure. Any device with a web browser can access Sparx Reader.

Students have taken their baseline assessment which matches their ebooks with their reading level. Sparx Reader then regularly checks their understanding of the story throughout the book by asking question based on comprehension of the text they are reading. Students are rewarded Sparx Reader Points by reading carefully and over time, their literacy and reading abilities will improve.

Students always have a choice in what they read. The e-book library has modern fiction books from many publishers as well as classic stories. Once pupils reach the gold level, they have autonomy over the text they choose; they can add their own books from home too.

Tasks are personalised based on each student's reading ability so that every student can be successful with their reading. The books that a student can choose from are carefully chosen so that the text is accessible yet suitably challenging.

In addition, and more recently, daily vocabulary puzzles are now available so pupils can discover and practise new words presented to them in context. Over time, this will support pupils develop their vocabulary. Teachers monitor progress closely and can focus on those that need intervention and support.

Honour to Benjamin Zephaniah (1958-2023)

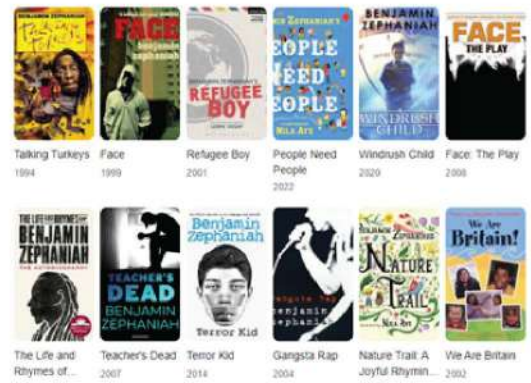


Benjamin Zephaniah, the British poet whose work often addressed political injustice, has died aged 65.

Zephaniah was born April 1958 in Handsworth, Birmingham, which he thought of as a "cold suburb of Kingston, Jamaica". He began performing poetry locally in his early teenage years.

In 1979, he moved to London, and his first collection, Pen Rhythm, was published. He began performing at demonstrations, youth gatherings and outside police stations. His poetry often directly responded to historical and current events.

His work, which appeared on the national curriculum, was heavily influenced by Jamaican music and poetry, and he was often classified as a dub poet. He also released a number of albums, and was the first person to record with the Wailers after the death of Bob Marley in a tribute to Nelson Mandela.

CPD DAY

On Friday 8th December, we hosted our first CPD day of the academic year here at TOAN!

As with every Community Pathway Day, we have a specific focus for each year group.

Our Y7 cohort had a Curriculum focus in Science which entailed them strategically planning a trip to mars using specific materials and budgets. They then had the opportunity to make their spacecrafts that would take them to mars and tested their durability and robustness! Finally, they completed presentations to their peers as to why and how their spacecraft would be successful.

Y8 had a specific focus on citizenship. This was led by Andrew Bernard, who firstly discussed the importance of positive relationships and signs of negative relationships. Andrew's sister made national news as she was tragically murdered by her partner in 2008. The second half of the day was dedicated to students planning and building houses for the homeless as part of the Dwell community project. This was a fantastic day for Y8 with pupils showing excellent citizenship towards challenging topics.

Y9 had a careers focus for the day. The company 'Loud Speaker' came into the academy where they ran a carousel of different workshops on specific topics such as resilience, public speaking, confidence building and enterprise. It was fantastic to see so many students go out of their comfort zone in order to enhance their personal development.

Y10 were fortunate enough to have an enterprise day ran by Adam Corbally from the apprentice. Here, pupils had the opportunity to listen to Adam's personal story and success as an entrepreneur, followed by a day of group tasks where students had to create a business from scratch and present their ideas to the whole year group!

All of the activities on the day were a huge success and well received by the visitors who ran sessions during CPD day. The next CPD day in March 22nd where some students will be visiting universities and colleges to enhance their understand of career opportunities.

The new cohort of year 10 pupils have recently just started on this year's Varsity programme, and all demonstrated how brilliant they all are. The school can't wait to see how this years cohort does.



In the corner of an ordinary school reception, two tables feed struggling families

It's a very typical school reception. Step inside and you're warmly greeted by welcoming staff behind the desk.

There's a waiting area with three sofas, a mural with motivational messages and a trophy cabinet showing the academy's achievements. But in the corner of the room, there is something you might not expect.

There are two tables. On top of one is dried pasta, rice, sauces, tinned vegetables and cereals. On the other there is more food, plus knitted hats, gloves and sanitary products.

This is the reality at The Oldham Academy North, in Royton, where a food bank is run each month. It's a reality headteacher Jessica Giraud couldn't have imagined as she began her career 20 years ago.

"I've always worked in schools in disadvantaged areas," she said. "But if I think back to my first school, in the centre of Leeds, in a really difficult area near the prison, we would never have even thought of having to do anything like this. It's just unimaginable."

The stark reality staff at the E-ACT academy face is that the need for support, to help children eat basic meals, has grown 'hugely'. On the last Friday of every month, parents and carers are welcome to pick up food and items that they need.

One of those parents, who used the food bank for the first time on Friday (November 24) is a dad-of-three, currently caring for his growing family and looking for a new job while battling soaring bills. "It's something I've been struggling with, well, the entire of my family has," he told the Manchester Evening News.

"It's a fairly big family, I've got three kids I'm looking after. My wife, she's a care assistant, currently she's on maternity leave. I think [the food bank] is quite helpful. I think it's a good gesture considering what many families are going through. Rent is going up, the price of food items, the cost of living generally."

The school had been supporting Oldham Food Bank, but last year decided the need was such that the academy should launch its own. Mrs Giraud said: "We would get to the point we would be sending off a big truck at the end of term [with donations to Oldham Food Bank]."

"But we were still getting families coming in, quite obviously in distress." Staff tried to help those families by passing on supermarket vouchers at first, but it became clear more needed to be done.



The M.E.N. spent Friday at the food bank, speaking to parents as they popped in. One mum visited the food bank alone. She spoke in limited English, but asked for the food bank and a member of reception staff assisted her.

She told the M.E.N. the food bank is 'good' for her family, and would help at a difficult time. She added: "Everything now, it's crisis."

Another mum arrived with her older daughter. They had come to speak to the academy about something else and didn't know about the food bank, but when a member of staff told them about it, they had a look.

The pair were reluctant to take much at first, picking up just a couple of bags of pasta, but they were told to take a carrier bag and get what they really needed. "She's struggling with finances," the daughter told the M.E.N.



She said the situation was 'getting worse', with a worry about bills and food prices. She insisted that the food picked up at the school would be 'helpful' to the family. The academy set up a monthly food bank last year, initially helping around 15 families. Now, at least double that number are supported, and the need is growing.

"I think by the end of the first one, it had all gone by 10.30am," said Mrs Giraud. The monthly foodbank is even more in demand before half term, since free school meals vouchers for holidays were stopped.



"There are kids that we do know that are going home and not eating properly," said Mrs Giraud. "It's the least we can do. We would love to be able to do it every week, but there's not enough... teachers are struggling as well."

"When I ask [for donations], it's just one tin, one extra thing in your trolley would really help. Everyone is struggling, keeping it going is hard work. But we know some of our families are just in absolutely desperate times. They are so grateful, but it must be a really hard thing to have to do [to use the academy's food bank]."

Mrs Lancaster, the school's head of professional services, is described by Mrs Giraud as the 'driving force' behind the food bank. She says the school is taking donations from 'wherever we can'.

But, as each month passes with higher costs for families, and both supermarkets and charities stretching their donations to help more people than ever, it's not an easy task to keep the food bank stocked each month. While Friday's food bank was open, Mrs Lancaster had secured the next donation from Asda.

With December's food bank expected to be busy ahead of the Christmas holidays, Mrs Lancaster was pleased to have stock already lined up. "We want to try and cater for all families that need it," she said. "We're just trying to get it out there for everyone."

Akila Naqqash, parent ambassador, has a child at the school. She is helping to build up the food bank and source donations to help other families who need it. "It's a bit of a help for the parents," she said. "Especially if they have children on holidays, it can be a bit of a squeeze."

Supermarkets are one of the key providers of donations, as well as staff, parents and charities, such as the Manchester United Foundation. With the rising cost of living having affected so many people over the past two years, it can be a tough task getting enough food to support the families who need it.

Mrs Giraud added: "It's a balance. Everybody is struggling, whatever level you are at. We'll do anything for our families. If we can provide that one meal that alleviates things, that can help get the kid into school... it helps them help us."

TOAN STUDENTS GET TOP WRITING TIPS FROM UK MEDIA EXPERT

E-ACT The Oldham Academy North welcome journalist and broadcaster Andrew Wright.

E-ACT The Oldham Academy North (TOAN) in Oldham welcomed journalist and broadcaster Andrew Wright to the school this month for a visit.

Andrew Wright is one of the UK's best known communications, leadership and media experts. He started his career in the TV industry working in some of the world's most dangerous countries.

As well as an Employer and Skills expert he is an award winning broadcaster, journalist and producer for the Radio and Television industry, he launched his own media company in 1997. He has spent 30 years travelling the world working in the media, experiencing other cultures, and helping people of all ages to be better communicators.

His work in every environment from presenting and producing live TV and radio studios, to reporting from war zones, to speechwriting for high profile figures, and building two businesses from scratch, has given him enormous experience which he now brings to schools throughout the UK.

Mr Wright met with a group of TOAN students and presented to them the ingredients of viewpoint writing that will help them to communicate perspectives through fictional and nonfiction texts.

He shared his own experiences of travelling the world working in the media and his thrilling account about the time he came under fire during the Siege of Sarajevo in 1992, thus encouraging students to understand how to craft stories based on personal experiences and how one might change perspective of a character depending on who is telling the story in the moment.



Jessica Giraud, Headteacher said:

"I want to say a big thank you to Andrew for taking the time to come along and speak to our students. The session with him was such an engaging interaction and students will take these learning points with them into their GCSEs and everyday life when they encounter stories told in the news or in a variety of social contexts."

Attendance Matters

We have the highest expectations of student attendance and rely on parents supporting us in ensuring the child's attendance is as close to 100% so they leave us with the best possible outcomes. We have a minimum target for all students of 97% which equates to no more than 6 days off in a school year. Our key value of endurance is so important to overcoming any barriers to attendance.

This year we have achieved our best ever results and it is no coincidence that our attendance is up there will the best in Oldham. Thank you for supporting us with excellent levels of attendance for your children.

Appointments:

Where possible appointments should be made outside of school time. If this is not possible then students must be in school before the appointment or return to school after the appointment. In some circumstances if we feel that the number of appointments is impacting on the students education, the Academy may not authorise the appointment.

Please contact heads of year at least 1 day in advance to let them know about the appointment. Please do not turn up at the school to pick up your child without letting us know in advance.

These appointments do impact on your child's attendance.

Absence procedures:

We rely on our parents working in partnership with us to ensure their child is only absent from school if absolutely necessary. Excellent attendance is key for excellent outcomes for students.

If we don't receive contact from parents this may lead to a home visit from a member of our pastoral team.

Attendance Rewards!

We reward all students with at least 97% with free ice cream at the end of every half term. This starts a fresh at the start of every half-term so all students have a good chance of achieving this throughout the year. In addition, we rewards 100% attendance weekly with big prizes and vouchers for all year groups.



Very Good (97%+)

With this level of attendance you have given yourself the best possible chance of fulfilling your academic potential. Good attendance also appeals to Colleges, Universities and Employers as it informs them you are dedicated and reliable.

Below Target (95.1 - 96%)

With this level of absence, your grades will have already started to suffer. You will have missed some important information in lessons and need to catch up! The Academy will be reviewing your absence level closely and may already be taking steps to ensure that it improves.

Not Good Enough (91% - 95%)

Your chances of success are definitely at risk. If you have been ill, the Academy will support you in doing the extra work needed to catch up. It is likely that if you have patterns of unexplained absences, the Academy will already be taking steps to ensure your attendance improves. This might include working with other agencies to support your family in helping you to improve your attendance or even taking court action. You will be expected to attend a meeting with the Attendance Manager and Progress Leader to discuss your attendance.

Unacceptable (90% and below)

Your attendance is a very serious concern. You are now classed as a persistent absentee and will already be working with the Academy to make sure your attendance improves. Continued absence will likely mean fines and court action. You will be referred to the Local Authority for fast track to prosecution.
